Middle School Flood

On the afternoon of Thursday, March 14, 2019, I received a panicked phone call from the piano teacher (Mrs. Harnett - my Mom) saying that there was flooding in the lower level of the middle school and that I needed to come right away. I made a quick call to Mr. Franczyk to ask him to come along, and within minutes we were on our way over to 600 Jefferson. As we entered the building and headed towards the lower level, I really had no idea what to expect, but it didn't take long to realize that we had a very big problem.



Mr. Franczyk and I arrived approximately 15 minutes after the flooding was noticed and there was already more than four inches of water covering the entire footprint of the lower level. Water could be seen gushing up from a trap door that leads to a crawl space under the lower level floor. As we watched, the water level continued to rise at a noticeable rate. Calls were

placed to the city and the plumbing company that we work with - SS Plumbing. Our top priority was to determine what was causing the flooding. After several conversations with different City of Winnipeg departments it was our own Matheson Property Manager, Andy Leclair, who was able to point us in the right



direction. A pressurized water line had sprung a leak and was flooding the school. We now knew that we needed to have the water service to the building shut off, and in the meantime we needed to try and get as much water out of the building as possible.

Soon, word spread that Faith Academy was in the midst of an emergency. Several people came to the school to offer their help and support including our Board Chair, Mr. Greg Stetski. With the help of SS plumbing, two large gas-powered water pumps were rented and we began pumping water out of the building towards Jefferson Avenue. It

took over four hours for the water service to be turned off by the city, and by that point the water was over three feet deep throughout the lower level. With the report that the water had been shut off, we expected to see the water begin to recede, but it continued to rise. We were perplexed and exhausted.

As we approached 10 p.m., the water level reached its maximum depth of just under four feet. However, despite having the water service turned off and running two large capacity pumps, the water level was barely receding. We decided to shut things down for the night and begin again in the morning. Early on Friday, March 15, Jefferson Property Manager, Ted Dick, and Andy Leclair noticed water forcing its way through cracks on Teakwood Avenue on the east side of the school. It turned out that the flooding wasn't being caused by our water service after all, but a water main break that had occurred across the street from the school. The water continued to rise after our water service had been shut off because the leak continued to pump pressurized water into our building. The flood waters eventually stopped rising because once the water reached a certain depth it began to rush out under the footing of our building. The city was contacted immediately and once the correct water line



was shut off, the water in the lower level of 600 Jefferson receded at a noticeable rate.

The flooding that took place at 600 Jefferson on Thursday, March 14, 2019 was disastrous. I would like to thank everyone who was involved in addressing the flooding as it took place and working through the aftermath. I would also like to acknowledge the hardship experienced by all those staff members who worked out of the lower level of the building and the Faith Academy Middle School in general. By God's grace, we were able to be back in the building after only missing six scheduled school days. Thank you to each middle school family for accommodating the school closure. The damaged materials in the lower level of the building have been removed and the rebuild efforts are set to begin shortly. It is our hope and prayer that we will be able to have the lower level restored for the beginning of the 2019/2020 school year. Please continue to pray for God's favour and grace as we move forward in the process.
